From 2019 to 2022, Travis was mentored by Hollywood screenwriter Steph Lady and was selected for AFTRS State and National Talent Camp. He was a finalist for Screen Australia's Writer's Incubator Initiative and has worked with producers across Australia, America, Canada and Ireland. In 2022, He was a finalist in the AACTA Regional Landscapes competition and was awarded a place in Australians in Film initiative, Untapped. He was also accepted into South Australia Film Corporation's prestigious Film Lab 2022 program and was awarded the Documentary Australia's Centralized Fellowship.

## DJAAMBI



DJAAMBI centres on Reg, a young Indigenous man, transitioning between past decisions and the new. Made raw in the wake of the death of his close cousin, Tjarrah; Reg's experiences with racism at the hands of his work colleague challenges his sense of identity, making him anxious. Embarking on a spiritual journey, reflecting on the past to reassure his present decisions, Tjarrah guides Reg through his grief. DJAAMBI touches on contemporary and often unforeseen by the privledged; themes of racism and mental health, while navigating one's place in Australian society, illustrating the impact of cultural overload and the aftermath of trauma.

# **ABORIGINAL WARRIOR**



Chris Collard grew up in a home without love. He thought the world hated him, so he hated it back. Going in and out of juvenile detention, and eventually turning eighteen behind bars, Chris decided to turn his life around. Realising he was repeating the detrimental cycles of those around him, he moved away from his family and friends to pursue kick boxing. Within five years he was a Kickboxing World Champion. Taking control of his future, Chris is now a loving father and husband who passes on the principles of Kickboxing to help youth learn anger management and self-respect.

Gary Hamaguchi is a Japanese/Aboriginal Jaru/Noongar man from Broome. He developed a love for film at an early age. Gary is an emerging screenwriter/director. He was selected to participate in the BLACK COMEDY, Season 3 writers' workshop for ABC and has been a long-time participant of the Goolarri Indigenous Writers Program. In 2019 Gary produced 2 shorts which premiered at the 2019 Sydney Film Festival, a drama "Doug, the Human"; and an environmental documentary "Saving Seagrass" which has screened on NITV. Gary is the Dialogue Director on 2 language episodes of season 2 of "Little J and Big Cuz", and directed award winning, "Aboriginal Warrior" and "LnJ Adventrues" as part of the NITV Our Stories program. Gary also directed soon to be released documentary series "Larapinta" which will air on NITV and SBS.

# **BUNKER: THE LAST FLEET**



The year is 2057. For six years the extra-terrestrial invaders have occupied our world. The harvest of humankind has begun. When they arrived, everything was lost. The people, the land the system....gone. Those who survive, remain in hiding and live by one rule: avoid all contact.

Tjarra, a strong Aboriginal warrior, fears she is the last of her people, the traditional custodians of the southern nations. Reo, an Australian/Vietnamese cyber hacker, struggles with his paraplegic condition and ill health. Together they survive in the outer regions within the confines of a hidden military bunker. Reo assists Tjarra by utilising an old military satellite technology

from within the bunker, allowing him to keep eyes on her from the sky, carefully tracking her in reconnaissance missions above ground. Hope it seems is hard to find in the midst of a storm.
