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


TRACKER

Artistic Director of Australian Dance Theatre, Wiradjuri director-choreographer Daniel Riley evokes an immensely powerful and personal story of his Great-Great Uncle, Alec "Tracker" Riley.

Alec, a Wiradjuri Elder and tracker, served the New South Wales Police Force for 40 years, leading numerous high-profile cases. As an Elder of his community he forged a path between the enforced colonial system in which he worked and his Wiradjuri lore. Tracker takes inspiration from his legacy and examines the battles First Nations people have shared for generations.

Weaving together dance, music and text, Tracker invites the audience into an open and transformative ceremonial space. This remarkable story is brought to life by a team of celebrated First Nations creatives, including award-winning playwright Ursula Yovich, co-director Rachael Maza AM, composers James Henry and Gary Watling, visual artist Jonathan Jones, lighting designer Chloe Ogilvie and an all-First Nations cast.





Daniel, a Wiradjuri man from Western NSW, began as Artistic Director of Australian Dance Theatre (ADT) in 2022. He is the sixth Artistic Director in the company's 57 year history, and the first First Nations person to be custodian of this iconic dance theatre company.



Rika Hamaguchi

Rika is from Broome in Western Australia. She is a descendant of the Yawuru, Bunaba, Bardi and Jaru people in the Kimberley Region. Rika also shares Japanese, Chinese and Scottish ancestry. Before joining Bangarra in 2015, Rika studied at NAISDA Dance College, where she was awarded the prestigious Chairman's Award.



Kaine Sultan-Babij

Kaine is a proud descendant of the Arrernte people of Harts Range in the Central Desert region of the Northern Territory. Born and raised in Whyalla (South Australia), Kaine also celebrates his Afghan and Croatian heritage. Kaine joined Bangarra in 2011 and in 2012 he was nominated for a Green Room Award for Best Male Dancer.



Ari Maza-Long

Ari Maza-Long graduated from the National Institute of Dramatic Art in 2021 and a month later was on stage in Belvoir's production of *At What Cost?* Born and raised into the world of performing arts, Ari began learning from an early age about the power of storytelling on stage and screen.



Gary Watling

Gary is a musician, composer, educator and a proud Wiradjuri man. After completing a Bachelor in Contemporary Music at Southern Cross University in 2010, Gary moved to Melbourne to pursue further study and completed his Bachelor in Music Performance (Degree with Honours) from the Victorian College of the Arts in 2011.
