Major Major outcomes

Saltbush Country

Celebrating great regional stories with seven fantastic female First Nations artists, *Saltbush Country* - curated by Tarnanthi Regional Curator Marika Davies, was the first regionally curated visual arts exhibition in partnership with Tarnanthi, the Art Gallery of South Australia's award-winning program.

Premiering in Port Pirie on Nukunu Country in September 2023, *Saltbush Country* then headed to Adelaide on Kaurna Country, before commencing its regional tour in Port Lincoln in June.

The exhibition explores family bonds, generational sharing, connection with Country, personal healing, revitalisation and maintenance of cultural practices, and stories about our shared history, utilising weaving, painting, textiles and fibre work, sculpture, large-scale installation and jewellery.

Euphoria National Tour

Euphoria by Emily Steel completed the final leg of a national tour – performing in Karratha and Geraldton in WA after performances in NSW and VIC - finishing in our own venues in Whyalla, Port Pirie, Renmark and Mount Gambier prior to the final season at the Odeon Theatre in Adelaide.

2,362 people across the country were moved and impressed by how this story reflects the highs and lows of living in a small regional town.

Working with Janet Laurence as her mentor over 12 months, Gail's solo exhibition was presented at Praxis Artspace.

Foundation

Nunga Screen 2024

The Country Arts Foundation shared stories, knowledge and cultural learning through our First Nations Program, Nunga Screen. This annual fundraising initiative gives workplaces the opportunity to watch a curated program of short films, animation and documentaries made by First Nations filmmakers.

Community

Audiences were more confident to attend live events with a 14% increase across our art centres to 160,980 people.

19,519 people performed on Country Arts SA's regional stages supported by a further 2,503 people backstage.

In partnership with seven local regional councils, Country Arts SA's arts and culture team delivered 107 events for regional artists and communities involving 12,902 participants.

The Regional Arts Fund supported 72 projects in 43 locations that attracted 258,904 attendees.

We thank SA Power Networks, the 10 regional local governments and 16 Community Circle small businesses that supported our work this year.

Chaffey Theatre's 40th Birthday

We commemorated the 40th birthday of the Chaffey Theatre in Renmark with a week of activities culminating in performances by the Australian Chamber Orchestra Collective Quartet on 24 May 2024.

In the evening audiences enjoyed an intimate performance on stage, preceded by three local pianists performing in the foyer. School students were fascinated by daytime performances of *How to Catch a Star*.

With dedicated funding from Department of the Premier and Cabinet, Country Arts SA supported the careers of regional artists in the **Forge program** (Artists Sustainable Careers). A total of 223 regional artists took part in:

- Workshops in documentary film production, poetry and critical response for First Nations artists
- Residencies for artists at Grindell's Hut, at our arts centres in Adelaide and Thuruna
- Professional development for visual artists in Nebula, Nebula Studio Snapshot and Breaking Ground
- First Nations film commission Gynburra – The Clem Graham Story
