

Middleback Arts Centre turns 40

In March 2025, the Middleback Arts Centre celebrated 40 years as the cultural and artistic centre of Whyalla.

Run by Country Arts SA, the centre has evolved into a modern facility featuring a 210-seat cinema and a 478-seat theatre. It hosts diverse Australian and international film and performances, including ballet, drama, theatre, and music.

This milestone moment honoured the centre's enduring role in the life of the region.

Nunga Screen

Nunga Screen continues to showcase the great work of First Nations filmmakers with free community screenings across SA. It has grown as a fundraising initiative, giving organisations the opportunity to share the stories and messages of this curated short film program in their workplace.

1500 people

attended screenings at Country Arts SA Arts Centres.

103 corporate packages purchased





Intersection is a bespoke professional development program connecting artists, craftspeople, designers and creatives in regional communities across South Australia. In 2025 it toured to the Spencer Gulf, Kangaroo Island, the Clare Valley, Burra, Murray Bridge and the Murray River, Lakes and Coorong.
